

CUDDINGTON & SANDIWAY TENNIS CLUB (C&STC)

RISK ASSESSMENT, Revised Aug 2023

INTRODUCTION

Cuddington & Sandiway Tennis Club (C&STC / The Club) is a member's only club open to primary and secondary school juniors, other students and to senior members. Courts 1 and 2 are also available to members of the public. The facilities are 6 carpeted tennis courts, all floodlit for winter play, and a single room club house approximately 7.5m wide, 7.25m long with double exit doors at front, providing two toilets, one fully accessible, kitchen facilities, storage and seating. There is also a wooden shed used for storing maintenance items.

All the courts and the club house are enclosed by 2.5m fencing with access via 2 separate gates, with secure access.

This risk assessment covers C&STC members, employees (coaching & maintenance) and visitors who may be playing tennis either socially or competitively, receiving coaching, or using the club house facilities, and non-members who are spectating or playing on Courts 1 and 2 on a pay as you go basis.

Inspections as outlined within the risk assessment below are recorded within an inspection report book, entries assessed by the Committee Facilities rep, then relevant actions noted and undertaken as necessary.

Safe Play Guidance is referred to within Club Rules and should also be read in conjunction with this risk assessment.
